Service Animal Guidelines

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In compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act as amended in 2008 and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Kishwaukee Colleges provided the following guidelines relative to having a service animal on campus.

What is a service animal?

A service anima(ho certification required) s defined as a dog or miniature horse that is individually tained to do work or perform a taster the benefit of a person with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. The task it is trained to do must be directly related to the person's disability flows.

Handler's responsibilities

- x Animal must be in handler's control at all times.
- x Animal must be leashed, tethered, or harnessed at all times. If the use of a leash, tether, or harness interferes with the task the animal is trained to do or if the handler's disability prevents the use of these devices, the animal must be under the handler's control through voice control or signals.
- x Handler is responsible for animal's belieav
- x Handler is responsible for any damage or injury to any individual on College property.
- x Handler must ensure all legal requirements are met for the presence of animals in public spaces, such as vaccinations, licensure, and ID tags as mandated byn**State**ab ordinances.
- x To the extent possible, animal should be **ratio**structive to the learning/working environment.

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
